Student Learning Outcomes and Enabling Objectives

- 1. Examine the history of how attitudes and behaviors have changed in criminal justice toward diverse populations.
 - a. Discuss the events and social movements in the United States impacting diverse groups.
 - b. Discuss how shifting societal attitudes towards diverse populations have impacted the criminal justice system.
- 2. Explore diverse populations' interactions with the criminal justice system.
 - a. Discuss what constitutes a marginalized group.
 - b. Explain the challenges of inequities towards diverse populations within the criminal justice system.
- 3. Investigate how perceptions, biases, and stereotypes impact interactions with different populations while enforcing the law and administering justice.
 - a. Determine how personal attitudes are formed and affect behavior and interactions.
 - b. Investigate how personal perceptions, discrimination (conscious and unconscious) and microaggressions contribute to inequality in criminal justice.
- 4. Explore self-awareness about diversity as a criminal justice professional.
 - a. Discuss the importance of developing self-awareness.
- 5. Explore professional responsiveness when dealing with diverse populations in criminal justice.
 - a. Examine the importance of specialized knowledge and training when dealing with diverse populations.
 - b. Explore the use of discretion and ethical decision-making.
 - c. Explain the ways in which unethical decision-making impacts justice and human rights.

- 4. How do CRJ professionals increase their self-awareness in order to relate effectively, ethically and appropriately to others in various criminal justice settings?
- 5. Why are skills, such as emotional intelligence and trauma-informed care training, essential to perform the duties of a CRJ professional in an ethical manner?
