CRJ2710 Introduction to Courts 3 Semester Credit Hours

Student Learning Outcomes and Enabling Objectives

- 1. Articulate the structure and functionality of the U.S. Judicial System.
 - a. Describe the hierarchical structure of the judicial system in their jurisdiction, including trial and appellate courts.
 - b. Explain the roles and responsibilities of key actors (the courtroom workgroup) within the court system, such as judges, attorneys, bailiffs, court clerks and probation/parole officers.
- 2. Explain the legal procedures and processes for a civil and criminal case.
 - a. Outline the stages of a typical civil and criminal court case, from filing a complaint to final judgment or verdict.
 - b. Explain the process of "voir dire" and the reasons why a jurist cannot serve on a jury.
 - c. Explain the rules for recusal for both a judge and attorney.
 - d. Demonstrate knowledge of essential legal terminology relevant to court proceedings.
 - e. Discuss the rights of an adult and a juvenile accused of a crime in the U.S. and the origin of these rights.
- 3. Explain the concept of legal principles and processes and their role in the administration of justice.
 - a. Apply foundational legal principles, such as due process, "stare decisis", "mens rea" and "actus reus" to real-world court cases.
 - b. Discuss the significance of landmark court decisions and their impact of their precedents on the development of the legal system.
 - c. Explain the strengths and weaknesses of legal arguments presented in real-world court cases.
 - d. Explain the controversy surrounding Three Strikes Laws, mandatory sentencing and waivers to adult court for juvenile cases.

- 4. Explore how judges and their ethical-decision making in the legal profession affect those on trial and society as a whole.
 - a. Explore the possible conflicts of interest of judges, especially those whose campaigns are financed by, and/or they receive gifts from people with agendas.
 - b. Discuss the broader societal implications of court decisions and their influence on society.
 - c. Examine the role of courts in safeguarding individual rights and upholding the rule of law.
 - d. Discuss how ethics and the recusal process plays a part in the administration of justice, as it pertains to attorneys and judges.
- 5. Discuss the impact of cultural, diversity, social standing, and politics on court proceedings.
 - a. Explain how cultural norms and values play in shaping the behavior of participants in court proceedings.
 - b. Explore how cultural diversity affects the composition of juries and their decision-making processes in court cases.
 - c. Discuss the impact of politics on the functioning of the court system.
 - d. Explain how the cultural background of a defendant or plaintiff influences their experience within the legal system.

Essential Questions

- 2. How do the processes of both a civil and criminal trial protect the rights of the accused?
- 3. Why do legal precedents, principles and laws relate to fair trials and sentencing?
- 4. How is the ethical integrity of courts maintained and threatened?
- 5. How do social standing and political affiliations impact court proceedings?
