Student Learning Outcomes and Enabling Objectives

- 1. Investigate the major developmental areas into quality programming for children birth to 35 months.
 - a. Compare a child's current chronological age development with historical and potential development.
 - b. Interpret data collected from developmental checklists, and planning for future development.
 - c. Record observations of physical environment.
 - d. Analyze the indoor and outdoor environments based on research and theory toinclude adaptations for atypically developing children.
- 2. Evaluate information that relates to providing support to children and families.
 - a. Compile information regarding policies and procedures at site placements.
 - b. Select policies that support individual child development and family needs.
 - c. Personalize communication with families, and interdisciplinary personnel with regards to created policy.
- 3. Incorporate observation and recording skills to establish a child's developmental level.
 - a. Reflect on real life scenarios.
 - b. Document child outcomes based on scenarios.
 - c. Establish child's baseline developmental level.
- 4. Identify the working definition of meaningful care when facilitating the development of infants and toddlers.
 - a. Investigate characteristics that high quality infant/toddler teachers consider to be important when working with children.
 - b. Draw conclusions from teacher characteristics to create a personal philosophy of an infant/toddler teacher.
