HLS 3050 Terrorists, Extremists and Kids Who Kill 3 Semester Credit Hours

Student Learning Outcomes and Enabling Objectives

- 1. Explain the historical evolution of terrorism and extremism in the U.S.
 - a. Discuss the difference between terrorism, extremism, insurgencies and guerilla warfare.
 - b. Explore the similarities and differences between the motivations of the people and groups that commit these violent acts, including "lone wolves", terrorists, extremists and revolutionaries.
- 2. Discuss the theories and reasons driving radicalization, and the role that ideology, politics, religion, society and culture plays in creating mass killers.
 - Compare terrorist organizations and networks, including but not limited to, Al-Qaeda, ISIS, global Jihadist Movements, Far-Right and Left-Wing Extremism, White Supremacy and Eco-Terrorism.
 - b. Explain recruitment strategies and tactics, the influence of social media, cult dynamics and groupthink on radicalization.
- 3. Explain the trends in terrorism since 9/11.
 - a. Discuss how the 9/11 event changed terrorism.
 - b. Examine likely targets of potential violence today in our diverse country based on socio- political issues.
 - c. Explain the National Terrorism Advisory System (NTAS) and its effectiveness in thwarting future acts of terrorism.
 - d. Discuss how mass shootings inspire "copycats".
- 4. Discuss the psychological and behavioral profiles of young people involved in school shootings, including risk factors, warning signs, and the role of early intervention in preventing such incidents.
 - a. Discuss the age, gender and social standing of the majority of school shooters in the U.S.
 - b. Explain the warning signs that are commonly overlooked in violent teens.

- c. Explore the role of social media in promoting violence among children.
- d. Discuss the failure of preventative measures in schools and families.
- 5. Examine how the rights and the privacy of individuals clash with the efforts of Homeland Security combating extremism and terrorism.
 - a. Explain how travel and immigration have changed since 9/11.
 - b. Discuss how mass surveillance for the sake of national security compromises an individual's right to privacy.
 - c. Explore how access to weapons fuels acts of terrorism, extremism and insurgencies.
