- 1. Examine how an OT ensures safe and effective care to achieve positive outcomes.
 - a. Indicate how professionalism can lead to positive consequences for occupational therapists, clients, and the discipline.
 - b. Identify the critical role OT plays in addressing, developing, and maintaining an ethical culture.
- 2. Examine the varied roles of the occupational therapist and the leadership skills needed to effectively fulfill them.
 - a. Compare and contrast the roles and responsibilities an occupational therapist may assume from their education and training to position them for leadership.
 - b. Explain the characteristics of a leader versus manager.
 - c. Compare and contrast the roles and responsibilities an occupational therapist may assume beyond practitioner, including but not limited to:
 - i. Manager
 - ii. Educator
 - iii. Consultant
 - iv. Entrepreneur
- 3. Explain the strategies OT practitioners use in order to be an advocate for the profession.
 - Discuss federal and state policy impact on service delivery, recipients of OT, and OT practitioners.
 - b. Identify ways OT can advocate for:
 - i. Persons
 - ii. Groups
 - iii. Populations
 - c. Identify the responsibility and accountability in providing OT services.

- 4. Discuss how occupational therapists can address health disparities, achieve health equity, and attain health literacy to improve the health and well-being of all.
 - a. Discuss societal needs by identifying emerging practice areas.
 - b. Articulate professional development opportunities to promote health and wellness for persons, groups, and populations.
- 5. Examine the relationship dynamics between an occupational therapist and occupational therapy assistant in order to forge a collaborative effort to deliver client centered care.
 - a. Identify the role of the occupational therapist and occupational therapy assistant in the screening and evaluation process.
 - b. Identify techniques required for supervision and collaboration with occupational therapy assistants.
