By the end of the course, students will demonstrate the ability to:

- 1. Explore social science disciplines (economics, political science, sociology, and ethics).
 - a. Discuss key concepts and terms associated with each discipline.
 - b. Examine key models and theories associated with each discipline.
 - c. Apply concepts, terms, models and theories to describe social science phenomena.
- 2. Investigate complex social problems
 - a. Examine social problems on a local, national, and global scale.
 - b. Integrate multiple social science perspectives to analyze social problems.
- 3. Evaluate cognitive, affective, and behavioral characteristics of intercultural competence.
 - a. Examine the complex ways diversity and inclusion (or lack thereof) influence the ways individuals and groups interact.
 - b. Analyze the relationships between diversity, inequality, and social, economic, and political power in the United States.
 - c. Analyze the relationships between diversity, inequality, and social, economic, and political power globally.
- 4. Complete a service learning experience.
 - a. Describe the concept of service learning in relation to civic knowledge.
 - b. Identify personal objectives and goals for the service-learning project.
 - c. Reflect critically on the experience of the service-learning project.
