 - b. Explore how ethical decision making is important in risk management within the social work profession.
 - c. Explore the importance of non-oppressive language in ethical standards, legal documents, and personal communications.
 - d. Apply the use of reflection and self-regulation when evaluating personal values and biases while engaging in social work practice.
